



# Chronic Hemorrhoids Treatment Options



When internal hemorrhoids do not go away on their own or when other treatments fail, you may want to consider a hemorrhoid artery embolization. **To treat chronic internal grade 1, 2 or 3 hemorrhoids, the following options are available:**

<b>Hemorrhoidectomy</b> A surgical procedure to remove the hemorrhoids.	✓	✗	✗	✗	✗	✗	✗
